



# LENNOX-GASTAUT SYNDROME

is a devastating and severe form of childhood epilepsy that can be very hard to treat

*If you or a loved one has been diagnosed with Lennox-Gastaut Syndrome (LGS), it may be time to explore what you can do to help find new treatment options.*

A new clinical research study is being conducted in your area to determine the effects of a potential new treatment, clobazam, in children and adults with LGS or those who experience LGS symptoms. Participation in a clinical study can help researchers learn more about the disease and can allow patients to gain access to medical care directly related to the study.

Enrollment is currently underway in the United States at more than 30 centers with neurologists who specialize in the treatment of LGS patients.

Individuals may be able to join the clobazam study if they currently have LGS, had LGS when they were young or have drop seizures but were never officially diagnosed with LGS. Among other requirements, participants:

- Must be between 2 and 60 years of age
- Must have been younger than 11 years of age at the onset of LGS
- Must be on one, but no more than three, antiepileptic drugs (AED)
- Willing to undergo study procedures, such as EEG recordings and routine blood draws.

Individuals meeting study requirements will be asked to participate in the study over a 23-week period. All medical care directly related to the study will be provided at no cost to participants.
